# School of Pharmacy Welcome in the BPharm programme -

This presentation aims to provide basic information relevant to the first year BPharm students of 2023

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**BPharm – degree: Important factors to keep in mind** 

- It is a four year degree
- Upon completion of the BPharm-degree you are required to conduct an *internship* of one year
- Upon completion of the *internship* you are required to conduct one year *Community Service* (work in a government facility)
- Upon completion of the *Community Service* you are required to register with the *South African Pharmacy Council (SAPC)* to practice as a Pharmacist within the boundaries of South Africa

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#### **BPharm – curriculum: An Overview**

- Terms/Abbreviations/Concepts relevant to the curriculum (previous slide)
- Module: "Subject" that forms part of the BPharm-curriculum
- Credits (Cr): The relative weight that a module contributes to the programme
- Each module has a module code and a description for the module, e.g. FLPX 113 *Physiology for Pharmacy IA*

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#### **BPharm – curriculum: Explanation**

- The BPharm-curriculum is a set curriculum (all BPharm students have the same modules)
- The BPharm-curriculum comprises 5 major disciplines (subjects): Pharmacology, Pharmaceutical Chemistry, Pharmaceutics, Clinical Pharmacy and Pharmacy Practice

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#### **BPharm – curriculum: Explanation of 5 major disciplines (subjects)**

- **Pharmacology:** Pharmacology can be defined as the study of the effect of drugs on the functioning of living systems.
- Pharmaceutical Chemistry: Pharmaceutical and medicinal chemistry describe the disciplines of drug design, chemical synthesis and biological evaluation of bio-active molecules, and pharmaceutical analysis of compounds.
- **Pharmaceutics:** In simple terms, Pharmaceutics means "the processing of drugs to medicine". This entails processing of the drug to medicines that is administered to patients.
- **Pharmacy Practice:** Pharmacy Practice modules have been selected and developed in order to broaden the knowledge and attitude of the undergraduate pharmacy student, and to develop skills relevant to the practice of the pharmacist as manager and communicator
- Clinical Pharmacy: Clinical Pharmacy is involved in teaching and research regarding clinical aspects of pharmacy

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## **BPharm – programme: Mode of Delivery for 2023**

- The programme will be delivered using a face-2-face (F2F) format and supplemented with online material where applicable (therefore a blended approach will be followed)
- Practical training forms an essential part of the training of BPharm-students – this entails (depending on year of study) laboratory based practicals, use of simulation facilities, and workplace learning

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## **BPharm – programme: Classes & Practicals**

- Classes and practicals are <u>compulsory</u> and can only be missed with a valid excuse, e.g. illness and official prove will be required (e.g. sick note)
- A minimum level of 80% participation is required in classes and practicals (it implies that only 20% may be missed with valid excuses)
- Assessment varies and depends on each module but broad guidelines will be presented on the next slide

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#### **BPharm – programme: Assessment**

- Similar to classes and practicals, participation in assessment opportunities is <u>compulsory</u> and can only be missed with a valid excuse, e.g. illness and official prove will be required (e.g. sick note)
- A minimum level of 80% participation in assessment opportunities is required (it implies that only 20% of assessment opportunities may be missed with valid excuses)
- Assessment opportunities are scheduled in advance certain assessments are scheduled in allocated official University assessment weeks and other assessment are scheduled during the course of the semester during contact sessions (online and F2F – depending on the module)
- Due to the full timetable and official scheduling of assessment opportunities the dates of assessment opportunities can not be moved. These dates are **SET**. **Do not** book holidays or make travel arrangements that are in conflict with the dates of the assessment opportunities
- Summative assessments will be conducted in all core modules presented by the School of Pharmacy
- A Module mark of at least 50% is required to pass a module
- Failure to pass a module will result in extending your BPharm studies with at least one year!
